

Governor's Foreword

The New York State Council on the Arts is the nation's preeminent state arts agency. Established as an *ad hoc* commission in 1960, the Council became a permanent state agency in 1965. Since 1960, every state in the Union has created an arts agency and five years after our effort began, the federal government followed our lead and established the National Endowments for the Arts and Humanities.

With its unchallenged status as the arts capital of the nation, New York State enters its third decade of public funding of the arts with hope, vitality and promise. The three years covered by this report bear witness to the richness and the beneficial impact of the arts in our State.

As well as providing joy and inspiration for all New Yorkers, the arts continue to provide opportunities for investment in our State's future. They promote tourism, stimulate income and employment, and provide economic benefits measuring far beyond the public dollars appropriated.

The responsibility of allocating public funds is a serious matter. In the case of New York State, the diversity of cultural activities provided for our citizens and recorded here pays tribute both to our superb arts organizations and to the continued leadership of the Council's board and staff.



Chairman's Review



As I review this report, I am impressed anew with the vitality of the arts in this great state. New York is indeed the arts capital of the world, and the New York State Council on the Arts has been instrumental in encouraging all forms of artistic activity throughout the state.

Reading through the list of organizations that have received public support through the Council over these past three years, I am reminded of my own travels across the state. I have had the pleasure of meeting with artists and audiences in towns and cities from the Great Lakes to Lake Champlain and from the Canadian border to the Atlantic Ocean. The Council's mandate is to bring the best of the arts to the people of New York, and we have helped to do just that. In the past three years more lives in more communities throughout this state were touched by the arts than ever before and we will continue to welcome more and more people to the arts, both as creators and as audiences.

During the three years covered by this report, the post of Executive Director was held by two men—Robert A. Mayer and Theodore W. Striggles. We are grateful to both for their dedication to the Council and to the arts. Robert Mayer deserves special recognition for returning to the Council to serve a second interim term as Executive Director. Later in this report, the Council's new Executive Director, Mary Hays, will present her outlook for the future. In these same years, the work of the New York State Council on the Arts would not have been possible without its exemplary staff, panels and board.

As the new decade begins, the Council on the Arts enters its twenty-first year. While solidifying its successes, the Council must address the new issues facing the arts today. Despite the fiscal constraints affecting both the Council and the arts organizations that are its constituents, creative solutions must—and will—be found. The arts are themselves a solution—a shining ray of hope and inspiration in a frequently confusing world. Across the state I have watched our citizens of all ages and backgrounds respond to a moving drama, listen atten-

tively to a poet's words, delight in a fine painting and thrill to a great voice. And each time I am reminded of that special power of the arts to touch and to bind us all in a common experience. Thus, a major goal for me, and for the New York State Council on the Arts, is to continue helping to provide these opportunities, so that each person's life will be touched by the arts.

Executive Director's Statement



Every organization has an evolution of its own that includes an adolescent period of growth and adjustment. The three years contained in this report were such a time for the Council. Governmental funding according to value judgments is relatively new

and its place as a proper public responsibility has finally found acceptance. Certainly, though, this did not come about easily nor without growing pains. It was a time of learning for the Council, the legislature and the public. Out of this experience the Council stands stronger with a firm public commitment to its role in our society.

In its early years, the Council directed modest funds to developing audiences for the arts throughout the State. The nurturing of these new audiences bore a rich harvest by the middle seventies. A growing public expressed its desire for greater accessibility to the arts. Everyone wanted to participate. The legislature translated this public sentiment into a mandate requiring the Council to deliver arts services worth 55 cents per person to each of the State's 62 counties. Following legislative instructions, the Council initiated a pilot decentralization program designed to give regrant funds to local and regional organizations. The Council also fulfilled its obligation to direct half its annual appropriation to the State's primary cultural institutions.

The Council improved its operations to meet these policy commitments. Program areas were redefined for greater clarity and responsiveness. The Council published written guidelines. It altered the composition of all advisory panels to ensure the participation of minority and regional communities in the decision-making process. New programs, such as Presenting Organizations, were developed to meet new needs. The Arts Service Organizations and Special Arts Services programs were expanded to reach new communities.

Change is controversial. The sometimes heated debate surrounding the Council's expanded role and prescribed mandate led to discoveries by all concerned. The Council gained increased awareness and accountability in fulfilling its tasks while the public discovered the difficulty, indeed the occa-

sional unpopularity, of disbursing State funds fairly. All parties matured in this process. The lessons of these years are invaluable as the Council, the legislature and the general public must face the impinging reality that only limited public resources will be available for effecting social policy in the future. The years of expanding economic activity to fill the public coffers appear to be over for now. It is the Council's responsibility, however, to make the difficult choices within these straitened circumstances. The Council's work over the past three years has created a strong foundation upon which to make these choices as wisely as possible.

The results of three rich and productive years for the New York State Council on the Arts are catalogued in these pages. A reading of this report clearly demonstrates that the arts are the means through which the unique qualities of a community or region are expressed and that it is the Council's obligation to recognize the diversity of the State as well as the artistic excellence of its institutions. A conscientious Council, industrious panels, and dedicated, hard working staff expended enormous amounts of energy to this end. I hope these years have also provided an equally rich and rewarding aesthetic experience for New York State's citizens and visitors.

INTRODUCTION

The New York State Council on the Arts, an agency of the state government, provides financial support toward the activities of nonprofit arts and cultural organizations in New York State, and helps to bring artistic performances and programs of high quality to the state's citizens. Its activities over three

years are reported in this book.

In completing its second decade, the Council sought to continue its support of the state's cultural institutions and to expand its own outreach and developmental efforts. As the arts themselves maintained their surging growth, and popular interest and attendance rose, the number of organizations supported by the Council increased each year. From 990 in 1976-77, the number grew to 1,090 in 1977-78, and rose to 1,207 and 1,240 the following years. The public funds available for this support increased from \$27,013,200 in 1977-78 to \$30 million and \$31 million.

The monies disbursed through the Council have supported the arts in each of New York's 62 counties. touching virtually every conceivable arts form. Although Council support does not subsidize the total operations of any group and does not in most instances cover the total cost of any individual project, it has lent a vitality to hundreds of arts groups and thousands of cultural events across the state. From small historical societies scattered across the North Country to large theatre companies in New York City; from the many outstanding symphony orchestras in urban centers to local arts councils in every corner of the state; from elaborate technical resource centers for film and video artists to the spare setting for a reading by a poet, the New York State Council on the Arts has aided cultural organizations in bringing their art to audiences numbering in the millions.

The three years here under review—1977-80—encompassed a variety of new forces, new arrangements and new activities affecting the arts in New York State. New York continued to be the nation's—and for many art forms the world's—focal point for the arts. Both artists and arts audiences grew in number, and major new works continued to be presented. Younger, less traditional art forms continued to grow, and the Council endeavored to respond to them, as well as to the needs of the individual artist not affiliated with an organization. Continued Council response to directives from the State Legislature resulted in further development of arts organizations across the state and greater accessibility to the

arts for the people of New York. The Council reorganized itself and in some program areas added to or expanded its responsibilities where new situations required this, and began to look at planning for the future in a systematic way. And all arts organizations, including the Council, had to cope with the pressures of inflation, recession and energy shortages, which made business and life difficult for both arts administrators and arts consumers.

This report distills and catalogs a group of activities perhaps best related to one another by their multiformity: the creative contributions of some 1,500 arts and cultural organizations in New York State. It also reflects the Council's critical evaluation of their work and the award of monies toward realization of both their art and the delivery of services across every county in the state to millions of citizens.

Established in 1960 as a temporary state commission, the New York State Council on the Arts became a permanent agency in the executive branch of the state's government in 1965. It was the first agency of its kind in the nation, predating the federal National Endowments for the Arts and Humanities and arts agencies now operating in every state. The Council's activities have evolved over the years from, in the beginning, conducting a study of the arts and their environment in New York, to its present role of contracting with nonprofit arts organizations for services to be provided to the state's citizens. At the same time, of course, the organizations are significantly aided by these contracts in maintaining their own financial and artistic viability.

The activities of the Council are determined both by its enabling legislation and by its annual appropriation from the State Legislature. The annual appropriation establishes both the Council's "state purposes" funds, which comprise its administrative budget, and its "local assistance" funds, which are the monies the Council has for the support of the arts for that year. The appropriation also frequently contains mandates directing the Council to respond to needs or priorities determined by the Legislature; some of these are described below. The enabling legislation establishes the Council's structure, and contains a statement of purpose, which reads:

It is hereby declared to be the policy of the state to join with private patrons and with institutions and professional organizations concerned with the arts to insure that the role of the arts in the life of our communities will continue to grow and will play an ever more significant part in the welfare and educational experience of our citizens and in maintaining the paramount position of this state in the nation and in the world as a cultural center.

The members are appointed by the Governor and are confirmed by the State Senate; they serve without salary. The board is headed by a chairman chosen from among its members by the Governor. Since 1976, Kitty Carlisle Hart has served in that position.

The governing board is supported in its responsibilities by a full-time staff of approximately ninety people, who carry out the day-to-day operations of the agency, particularly the initial review and evaluation of requests for support made by nearly 2,000 arts groups each year. Working between the board and the staff are almost 150 panelists, who are at the heart of the Council's peer review process. The panelists are generally working artists or administrators, selected to provide broad and expert perspectives in each arts discipline. Further support is provided by scores of performance auditors and field representatives, also chosen from the active arts field, who assist the staff with occasional evaluations of specified performances or programs. Finally, several consultants are periodically contracted by the Council to provide technical assistance to arts organizations in a variety of areas.

The Council during 1977-80 was composed of thirteen program departments, grouped into three divisions, as follows.

Division of Communication and Visual Arts Architecture and Environmental Arts Film Literature Media Museum Aid Visual Arts Services Division of Performing Arts Dance Music **Presenting Organizations** Theatre Division of Special Programs **Arts Service Organizations** Decentralization Special Arts Services

At the heart of the Council's work are its decisions about which eligible organizations are to receive contracts for what portions of the Council's limited local assistance funds. A detailed, four-step application review process is employed to this end. The first step, after applications have been received at the Council offices, is staff analysis of the applications. Program analysts review the artistic quality of the projects for which support is requested, the services that the organization provides and the external context in which the organization may operate. Fiscal staff review an organization's financial and budgetary records and plans. Generally, the Council's staff meets with representatives of an applicant organization, visits its facilities, attends performances or exhibits and otherwise becomes familiar with the organization and its work.

Based on its own analysis and the information received from program auditors and field representatives, the Council staff makes initial recommendations for funding. These recommendations are forwarded to the second level of the review process, the Council's advisory panels. Each request for assistance in each application is reviewed by one or more panels. Panelists meet regularly during the fiscal year with members of the Council staff to examine, analyze, discuss and develop recommendations regarding applications.

The panels' recommendations are then taken to the third step of the review process, committees made up of members of the Council's governing board. Again, the requests are reviewed and voted upon. The committees' recommendations are referred to the final stage of the review process, a vote by the full governing board. Only the board itself can approve the award of a contract to an organization. If the board's decision is favorable, the organi-

zation is invited to enter into a Cultural Services Contract with New York State by which the organization agrees to provide specific services in return for Council funding. The awards are not outright grants, but contractual payments toward the performance of arts services in New York State.

While the Council's foremost concern in reviewing an application is the artistic quality of the proposed program, it also takes into account such other factors as service to the public, the managerial and fiscal competence of the organization, whether comparable services exist in the same area, and what other public or private support has been secured or is available.

The governing board of the Council has strongly endorsed a pluralistic funding strategy—itself embedded in the Council's enabling legislation—emphasizing partnerships between the Council and such other funding sources as the federal National Endowment for the Arts, municipal and county governmental agencies, foundations, corporations and individuals. Frequently Council support serves to attract aid from these other sponsors, and particularly can stimulate private contributions. The sharing of this role can also enable public funds to have a broader impact, both geographically and across the arts community, than they might otherwise have.

New York State, of course, possesses an immense and unparelleled wealth of arts resources, in human, organizational, creative, technical and market aspects. And, New York artists and organizations produce not only for their own environment but also for export: taking artistic risks and serving as a laboratory for creative experimentation, they frequently point their field in new directions, and they also perform or send exhibits across the rest of the country and the world. But New York artists are also blessed at home with probably the most articulate and enthusiastic—and demanding—arts audience to be found in the country. The state's arts base is exceptionally broad and strong, and it is constantly renewing.

From the Council's legally mandated responsibilities, one can infer two prominent constituencies. The first is the citizens of the state, to whom the Council is obligated to provide excellence in arts services. One finds in the enabling legislation the declaration that, "with increasing leisure time, the practice and enjoyment of the arts are of increasing importance and ... the general welfare of the people of the state will be promoted by giving further recognition to the arts as a vital aspect of our

culture and heritage and as a valued means of expanding the scope of our educational programs."

The second constituency is the arts organizations of the state themselves. It is they who give New York State its "paramount position in the nation and in the world as a cultural center," which the creating legislation directs the Council to maintain. But although New York was the first state officially to recognize the importance of the arts in our public life, the maintenance of this unparalleled arts community and the challenge of sharing its handiwork across the state have always been difficult. The arts are expensive, no matter where they are produced, and the income derived from audiences rarely—and for many organizations never—covers their expenses.

The Council's work, and the legislature's stated priorities, have attended to these constituencies, especially through the "primary organization" and the per capita county funding policies. Both were established in the mid-1970s.

By law the Council is required to direct half of its total local assistance budget to the state's "primary" or major cultural institutions, which are critical to the health of New York's arts world. Over the years discussed in this report, approximately one hundred organizations were designated as primary, generally to recognize exceptional and continued contributions to their arts disciplines or singular services to their communities. Initiated at a time when severe economic stress threatened the future of many arts organizations, large as well as small, this policy was accompanied by a very substantial rise in state support of the arts and was crucial to seeing many organizations through the onset of high inflation and recession.

The per capita funding policy mandates the Council to direct support to each of the state's counties in an amount equivalent to at least fifty-five cents for each person living in the county. In thus spreading



the benefits of state support, the Council began a certain amount of developmental work, encouraging the growth and professional maturation of organizations in many parts of the state, rural and urban. Also, the Council has in some instances promoted a group of statewide assistance programs in its efforts to meet the per capita requirements. These programs have provided artist appearances in many disciplines, as well as services to indigenous groups (they are described in further detail below).

Another legislative mandate was responsible for the creation of the Council's newest program, Decentralization. With the assistance of the National Endowment for the Arts, the Council established this program to decentralize decision-making on certain applications for support of the arts, thus contributing to larger outreach and development efforts. Locally-based regranting institutions—which accept and review applications and arrange Cultural Service Contracts much as the Council itself does were selected and developed for what was initially a pilot project of the Council (by 1980-81 its pilot status ended, and Decentralization became a permanent Council program). Many arts organizations especially small, developing groups, often community-based—thus were supplied with a new funding source readily accessible and probably more attuned to their local situations.

Decentralization has served to support the arts in many small or insulated communities, where the Council's profile had previously been limited, and has successfully injected local perspectives into this part of the Council's work. From five regranting agencies serving nine counties in 1977-78, the Decentralization Program has grown to a projected fifteen sites serving twenty-three counties for 1981-82. The counties in which these projects operate both densely populated urban settings and sparsely settled rural areas—are listed in the Decentralization chapter that appears in this report.

Other changes at the Council also contributed to this theme of wider accessibility, complementing the major theme of supporting the state's ongoing cultural institutions. One was the creation of the Presenting Organizations Program, which has helped to bring high-quality performing arts companies and artists to large and small cities across the state. Establishment of this program brought together activities previously scattered about the Council, and recognized the existence of an important and growing constituency of presentors across the state. Among the highlights of the program's first years and of these three years for the Council itself—was its major support and liaison role in the New York City Ballet's upstate tour (described more fully in the program's chapter in this report). The project provided support to one of the world's premier dance companies, an extraordinary opportunity for the thousands of upstate dancegoers who attended the sold-out performances, and boosts to the upstate arts scene and local economies.

Also, expansion of the Arts Service Organizations and Special Arts Services Programs extended Council support provided through those programs to more communities, both geographic and ethnic, in the state. With the assistance of National Endowment for the Arts funds, the Council created a History Museums Coordinator position in its Museum Aid Program. This was done to enable the Council to attend more directly to local history museums and historical societies, found in dozens of counties and towns. Similarly, the Visual Arts Services Program has an Upstate Visual Arts Coordinator, who is based outside New York City. Much of this staff member's work has been developmental, including dealing with visual arts organizations not yet apply-

ing to the Council.

During 1980 the Council, with the assistance of a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts, created in the Division of Special Programs the new position of Folk Arts Coordinator to explore its involvement with folklife. Folklife encompasses a variety of traditional cultural forms shared by groups over time on the basis of common regional, ethnic or occupational identities, and is learned and transmitted generally by informal means, such as from performances, through example, or in oral tradition, rather than formal or academic methods. Folklife represents an important dimension of New York State's extraordinary cultural diversity, ranging from Adirondack pack basket making, Black gospel, and local legends of the Niagara Frontier to Irish American step dancing and the traditional maritime practices of Eastern Long Island. The Folk Arts Coordinator has been engaged in surveying the folklife resources of the state, assessing the needs of folk artists, acting in a developmental capacity with organizations planning folklife activities and refining Council guidelines to establish a broader recognition and encouragement of folklife activities.

Through Council support of ECOH (Exploring Cultural Opportunities for the Handicapped, a program of the Council for the Arts in Westchester), and through programming designed by Council applicants, the issue of providing the handicapped

with equal access to cultural activities has been pursued. Through its application and review process, the Council has sought to encourage applicants' compliance with federal legislation in this area.

In New York State, and especially in its urban areas, members of minority communities have become increasingly active in seeking participation and services in the arts. The Council deals regularly with groups of applicants representing particular minority constituencies. Through meetings with these representatives, concerns common to these organizations are made known and incorporated into the Council's progamming and planning. Through the Special Arts Services Program, ethnic constituencies are sought out and their organizations are nurtured so that all citizens of the state can have access to cultural experiences of their preference.

Late in the 1979-80 fiscal year, the Council staff began preparation of a Regional Arts Inventory, conceived as the first step in a long-range planning project for the Council. For this project, first presented at the Council board's 1980 Policy Planning Meeting, the state was divided into regions characterized by geography, transportation systems, perceived psychological and sociological relationships, and cultural activity patterns. Data was collected on these features, as well as on population, economic and climatic factors. The staff then developed statements and statistics on how each of the Council's programs related to each region. These juxtapositions cast light on several relationships not apparent to the casual observer, and identified different needs and priorities for each region and set a larger framework for future Council activity. The purpose of this project and the long-range planning is to evaluate how the Council responds and relates to the cultural activities of the separate and diverse parts of the state, and to analyze how the Council might better serve the citizens of each region with regard to the arts.

As this three-year period drew to a close, the Council also assessed its past and possible future responses to another major and continuing issue, that of support for the individual artist. The Council's enabling legislation does not empower it to fund individual artists by contracting with them directly, but its support of more than a thousand nonprofit organizations each year in scores of different fields provides many opportunities for the individual artist. These include, as a sampling, music, choreography and visual arts commissions, writers'

readings, screenwriters' and architects' fellowships, and filmmakers' production expenses. In each of these years, perhaps the major indicator of the Council's commitment to assist the individual artist was its support of CAPS, the Creative Artist Public Service Program. CAPS offers fellowships in twelve arts disciplines; these involve performance of various types of public and community services. As the 1980-81 funding year began, the Council announced the establishment of a task force, made up of artists from across the state and assisted by Council staff, to study this issue, conduct public hearings in several cities around the state and provide recommendations to the Council's board for improved and increased responses to individual artists, whose work is in the aggregate crucial to achievement of the Council's mandated goals.

Not all of the 1977-80 developments dealt with policy or performances or presentations. In other areas, the Council began exploring the development and uses of basic statistical data on the arts community of the state. Necessarily a long-term project, the organization of such information will be important in assessing the future needs of New York's arts population, and will help in determining the contributions of the arts to tourism and business in the state.

In the middle and late 1970s, the arts community both its commercial and nonprofit sectors—began to make clear its major role in attracting tourists to New York State and in aiding business establishments that enjoy ancillary benefits from people attending arts events. New York City's many major performing companies, galleries and museums, and its smaller, more experimental groups; Broadway theatre; such upstate organizations as the Saratoga Performing Arts Center, the Chautauqua Institution, the symphony orchestras of Rochester, Buffalo, Syracuse and Albany, and many festivals, were all drawing visitors from other parts of the region and the nation, injecting into the state economic activity that might not otherwise have taken place. A study by the Louis Harris polling organization concluded that the arts accounted for nearly half (48%) of the state's tourism—which itself is one of New York State's major industries, accounting for some \$7 billion a year.

Tourism is perhaps the most distinctive way in which the arts contribute to the state's economic health—and indeed New York State is home to an unparalleled concentration of arts activities. No other state produces or attracts artists, and arts consumers, as New York does. But these organizations



form a vital part of the state's economic picture in other ways. Their contributions to the quality of life needs no retelling. But they also employ tens of thousands of people, spend nearly half a billion dollars each year, and benefit all kinds of ancillary businesses, such as restaurants, hotels, parking garages, taxis and shops. Far from a distant or wary unconcern, the arts and business form a vital partnership.

Demonstrations of this role in New York State alone have been provided by studies of exhibitions at the Metropolitan Museum of Art and the Museum of Modern Art, of the New York City Ballet's upstate tour and of the commercial Broadway theatre (which depends greatly on the nonprofit theatre community for plays, personnel and training). A Yankelovich, Skelly and White study of the Metropolitan Museum's "Treasures of Tutankhamun" showed that the exhibition generated more than \$1 million a day into the city's economy, spent by out-of-town visitors coming specifically for the exhibition on hotels, restaurants, entertainment, transportation and shopping.

The partnership of the arts and business extends further, too, and into less quantifiable arenas. Such industries as advertising, media, publishing, fashion, interior design, filmmaking and recording rely on the arts for both talent and ideas. More generally still, the arts contribute amenities to the communities in which they are located, helping to meet the population's appetite for cultural activities as well as attracting new businesses seeking locations. They also can be the crux of the revitalization of entire neighborhoods: one need look no further than New York City's Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts for a dramatic example of this.

For some years now the Council's work has been strongly aided by a group of organizations known collectively as Special Assistance Programs. These organizations have provided funding and services addressing many of the special needs of artists, arts organizations and community groups undertaking cultural programming. Their work has been especially important in bringing expertise and professional assistance to local organizations with limited financial support and resources. Among other things, they have provided free or low cost artists' residencies, equipment loans, costume and film rentals, technical and legal assistance, printing services, insurance and transportation, publications and workshops. The Special Assistance Programs include

Center for Arts Information, Costume Collection, Publishing Center for Cultural Resources, America the Beautiful Fund, Creative Artists Public Service Program, Media Bureau, Meet the Composer, New York Foundation for the Arts and its Artists-in-the-Schools Program, Poets and Writers, New York State Poets-in-the-Schools, Visiting Artists Program, Young Filmakers/Video Arts, Gallery Association of New York State, Preservation League of New York State, and Regional Conference of Historical Agencies. (For a description of a Council marketing project involving these programs, see the chapter on the Arts Service Organizations Program in this report).

Technical assistance, one of the Council's oldest services to arts organizations, is another major developmental resource. Each year funds are provided for assignment by the Council program departments of expert consultants to work with arts organizations faced with problems their own staff may not be equipped to handle. This aid has been available in many administrative areas, including accounting, budgeting, planning, fundraising, marketing and development of boards of directors. Technical assistance is not a financial award, and is separate from the Cultural Services Contract awards recorded in this report. Various Council-supported conferences, such as those for opera companies and performing arts presentors, have represented another dimension of assistance to groups in development of organization skills.

Lake Placid was the site of the 1980 Winter Olympics, and the arts were a part of that environment. Council support assisted the placement of an outdoor sculpture exhibit, the presentation of video works and several performing arts events in and around the Lake Placid area during the Olympic Games.

With the support of Philip Morris Inc., the Council organized "New York: Art on the Road," an exhibition demonstrating the extraordinary richness and variety of the state's visual arts institutions and showing the outreach of these institutions to the rest of the country and the world. Consisting of 97 posters from exhibitions organized by the state's cultural institutions and circulated nationwide and through foreign countries, "New York: Art on the Road" opened in October 1979 in Washington, D.C., as part of the "New York Loves Congress" festival. Subsequently installed at the U.S. Department of Commerce in Washington, it had its New York State opening at the State Museum in Albany. Since then it has toured in New York State, with an October 1980 New York City opening, at the New-York

Historical Society, where it had a companion exhibition, "New York: Art in the City."

In 1979-80, the Council developed changes in its applications for the following year. These included the collection of certain audience, employment and energy data, and the streamlining of financial and budgetary reporting procedures for applicants.

The Council has taken an active role in arts advocacy efforts. Representatives of the Council, particularly Chairman Kitty Carlisle Hart, have addressed several state, regional and national meetings, including Congressional hearings on the arts. Media projects, including public service announcements calling attention to the arts, were explored and developed for airing in 1981.

Explanatory Note

The listings on the following pages report local assistance awards by the New York State Council on the Arts for the years 1977-78, 1978-79 and 1979-80. Unless otherwise noted, these figures reflect only expenditures of funds appropriated by the New York State Legislature, and exclude federal monies that are regranted by the Council. Any contract adjustments or modifications made subsequent to the intitial award voted on by the Council board are contained within the figures.

Organizations appear in an order alphabetized by full legal names, within each of the Council's program departments. Unless incorporated in the organizational name, the city in which the organization is located is listed in parentheses following the group's name. The separate boroughs of New York City are listed as locations where possible; Manhattan

is entered as "NYC."

Many organizations receive assistance from more than one Council program. The index enables the reader to locate every instance of financial support awarded to a particular organization.

Descriptions of the particular services supported through any individual contract can be obtained by writing to the Council's Office of Public Information.



Architecture and Environmental Arts Program

New York State is fortunately endowed with one of the most unique and varied physical environments in the nation. The allure and excitement of both New York State and New York City are due in part to the quality of its architecture, a building heritage that spans 300 years and continues to set the design standard for the nation and the world.

Reflecting the preeminence of the state in the development of American industry and commerce, such upstate urban centers as Rochester, Buffalo, Syracuse and Albany possess a rich lode of significant architecture that the public is now beginning to recognize as worthy of preservation. Small farming communities that comprise a virtual textbook of vernacular architectural styles are a reminder that New York State has one of the nation's largest rural populations. An important component of New York's aesthetic heritage is the unsurpassed beauty of the state's natural environment: the Finger Lakes region, the Thousand Islands, the Adirondacks, the Catskills and the beaches of Long Island are some of the many superb scenic areas that New York residents cherish and enjoy.

In order to ensure that the state protects its many assets and to encourage high quality contemporary architecture, landscape architecture and design, the Architecture and Environmental Arts Program supports projects that increase the public's awareness and appreciation of its physical surroundings. Architecture and design are the disciplines that perhaps touch the public more pervasively than other art forms: we are daily influenced by the quality of our environment-both man-made and natural-and are strongly affected by the consequences of good and bad design. By helping to educate the public on its physical surroundings, organizations supported by the Architecture and Environmental Arts Program make a major contribution not only to improving the artistic milieux of communities but also to enhancing the quality of life across the state.

Architecture and Environmental Arts Program support takes many forms. Perhaps the backbone of the Program is the provision of Basic Support. During 1977-80 this was directed to approximately thirty major organizations that along with practicing design professionals set the state's architectural tone. The concerns of these important groups include, but are not limited to: contemporary architectural issues (e.g., Institute for Architecture and Urban Studies); historic preservation (Landmark Society of Western New York, Historic Albany Foundation, Preservation League of New York State); community design services (Pratt Institute for Community

and Environmental Development, Plan-Build, Troy Professional Assistance/TAP); the improvement of the urban environment (Municipal Art Society); and conservation of rural and semi-rural areas (Catskill Center for Conservation and Development, Center for Hudson River Valley). Organizations such as these are precious resources to the state not only for their own projects, but also for the technical assistance they provide to the many smaller groups that have recently emerged in the wake of the public's renewed concern over environmental and architectural issues. In addition to the public information programs sponsored by the major groups, there is also a heterogeneous body of arts centers, historical societies, museums, arts councils and government agencies that conduct architecture- or design-related projects on an occasional basis. The 1980 exhibition on revitalization efforts in the South Bronx at the Bronx Museum of Art is an example of a public information project funded by the Architecture and Environmental Arts Program at an institution whose interests are not primarily architectural.

Another important category of Architecture and Environmental Arts support is Cultural Facilities, a program begun in 1978 that enables organizations to improve and expand places where the arts are presented and experienced. This program has been especially popular with music, dance and theatre groups seeking better facilities in which to perform. Museums, too, have benefited from Cultural Facilities support with funds provided to upgrade gallery space. In some instances, the program has been a boon to historic preservation by giving impetus to the reuse of an outmoded but architecturally significant structure. Architecture and Environmental Arts committed \$221,000 to Cultural Facilities studies in the first two years of the category's existence to

forty-two organizations.

Because the field of architecture encompasses thousands of professionals actively engaged in making a living through design, the Architecture and Environmental Arts Program also provides support to allow professionals the time to conduct research that affects the design, conservation or improvement of a community's architectural and natural resources. Through Council funding to the Educational Facilities Lab, the Project Fellowship Program was initiated in 1978; in its first two years, it committed a total of \$126,000 to fourteen recipients to this end. The value and quality of these projects have been extraordinarily high, and the response from both the professional and general communities enthusiastic.

In summary, architecture and design address the basic human need for shelter and our inherent desire to enhance the environment we inhabit.







Arts Service Organizations Program

Since 1970-71, the Arts Service Organizations Program has supported community and regional arts councils, multi-arts centers and interdisciplinary service organizations in New York State. During the three years of this report, Arts Service Organizations funds have been used in traditional support of these groups' general administrative and operating expenses. Increased emphasis, however, has been placed on special arts programming, infusing the Arts Service Organizations Program and the field with a number of innovative new programming possibilities.

In 1977-78, the Arts Service Organizations Program initiated a cooperative project with CETA (Comprehensive Employment and Training Act) sites whereby the Council provided support toward the costs of arts supplies and transportation for CETA projects. Service organizations and local arts councils throughout the state played a major role in developing thousands of CETA jobs for artists and arts-related activities, for which the Council's funds provided substantial supplemental support. In New York City, the Cultural Council Foundation developed the largest CETA arts project in the nation; hundreds of artists gave hundreds of performances, workshops, exhibitions and other community services to the people of New York City with the assistance of Council funds. Arts Development Services in Buffalo developed a major downtown mural project through CETA and the State Council and also successfully pioneered a public service team of artists to design posters and printed materials for community organizations. The Hornell Area Arts Council in Steuben County developed an arts outreach project to provide workshops and classes in the visual arts. In Rochester, approximately sixty jobs were created for artists to provide community services.

The Arts Service Organizations Program recently supported a number of local arts councils in the improvement of cultural facilities as well. In rural areas, the Schoharie County Arts Council renovated the basement of a library in downtown Cobleskill into a year-round exhibition center, a valuable new resource in that area; and the Ballard Mill Arts Center, developed by the Greater Malone Community Council Arts Committee, has become one of the major cultural centers of the North Country since its establishment. Several local arts councils and arts centers have been responsible for saving important buildings for cultural use, including the Smithtown Township Arts Council, the Arts Council for Wyo-

ming County, the Mid-Hudson Arts and Science Center, and the East End Arts and Humanities Council.

Public access has remained a priority, and support to the Arts Council of Westchester has helped make possible the development of an important project to provide better access and improved cultural services to the handicapped. Through Exploring Cultural Opportunities for the Handicapped (ECOH), a statewide information network has evolved in the last three years.

Many public arts events also receive partial funding from the Council. In New York City, the Arts Service Organizations Program allocated funds to District 1199, the health and hospital workers union, for a major Labor Day Festival which draws a huge audience, and, upstate, to the Niagara Falls Arts Council for its major summer festivals which attract thousands of visitors and local residents to downtown Niagara Falls.

On the statewide level, the Arts Service Organizations Program provides support to Creative Artists Program Services/CAPS, which offers fellowships involving performance of public service to individual artists. During 1977-80, 542 fellowships were awarded to artists in various artistic disciplines who fulfilled the public service requirement by giving readings, workshops, performances, demonstrations and presentations throughout the state. All such community events were presented through nonprofit organizations and were open to the general public, with special effort made to reach senior citizen, youth, hospital and prison groups. Arts Service Organizations also provides partial support to the Alliance for New York State Arts Councils and the Center for Arts Information, both of which have become valuable statewide service groups. The Alliance has consistently provided workshops, technical assistance and management services to the network of community arts agencies throughout the state; and the Center for Arts Information has published a number of books and other publications of special interest to artists and arts professionals and maintains an arts resources library available for use to the public as well as a telephone information

Also with the assistance of a National Endowment for the Arts grant, the Council conducted a marketing project for Special Assistance Programs. These are a diverse group of arts service and funding organizations established to address the specialized needs of the arts professions and of communities undertaking cultural programming activities throughout New York State, and are supported in part by

Working through this marketing project, the Council collected information from the participating groups, created publicity materials, conducted workshops across the state and worked with a variety of community groups. With the availability of these services more widely known, demand for them increased, and many cities and counties were newly served by, for example, Poets and Writers readings and Meet the Composers appearances. The project also resulted in fruitful cross-referrals between and among the Special Assistance Programs and community groups and bookers across the state.








Dance Program

In the past ten years, dance has experienced an unprecedented popularity all over America. With more dance companies located here than anywhere else, New York State remains the recognized dance capital of the world. From New York City's Lincoln Center where two of the finest international ballet companies, New York City Ballet and American Ballet Theatre, are resident for an aggregate total of 33-35 weeks annually, to the spare Soho lofts from which the new and experimental emanate, to many regional companies throughout the state, dance, in all its forms, thrives. New York State's dance activity is continually the source for new developments in the art form, and New York State, as a performance site, serves as a measure of accomplishment for dancers, choreographers and companies. The Council's support of professional dance in New York State appropriately takes a double pronged approach: through direct support of the making of dance itself and through support of the dissemination of dance performance.

The Council's Dance Program has been able to focus almost entirely on assisting the production of dance (primarily through support toward artists' salaries for rehearsals and public performances) since 1978-79, when the Council introduced its new Presenting Organizations Program. That program concentrates on the improvement and support of the statewide network of sponsors vital to the expansion of the performing arts throughout New York State. The Council's directives for the Dance Program during the three years of this report addressed two major goals, viewed with equal importance: to provide a significant level of funding to the state's major and nationally recognized institutions, and to increase support to the constituency of small dance companies within the state. With the Dance Program budget steadily decreasing, the Council, in meeting these directives, found it necessary to implement a more stringent review process, so that those companies that did receive funding received more meaningful amounts.

Among the major ballet companies of international reputation, the Joffrey Ballet, the Feld Ballet and Dance Theatre of Harlem, as well as New York City Ballet and American Ballet Theatre, continued to receive significant support. (In 1979-80, the Joffrey Ballet projected no New York City season and was not funded for that year; however, it did receive 1980-81 support.) The major modern dance organizations, including the companies of Paul Taylor,

Twyla Tharp, Alvin Ailey, Merce Cunningham, the José Limón Dance Company, the Nikolais/Louis Foundation and the Martha Graham Center all received Council support during this three year period. The experimental and avant garde dance companies supported by Council funds included Trisha Brown Dance Company, Laura Dean Dancers and Musicians, Douglas Dunn and Dancers, and Lucinda Childs Dance Foundation, all of which contribute constantly to the excitement and growth of dance. Assisted as well were many fine ethnic dance companies including Dances and Drums of Africa, Saeko Ichinohe Company and the Dinizulu Dancers. These groups are representative of the scores of companies

the Dance Program has supported.

Additionally, small and/or developing companies were furthered through the Dance Program's support of various special projects and dance service and management organizations. The Council supported a number of dance series including those of the Theatre of the Riverside Church, Dance Theater Workshop and Technical Assistance Group (TAG). TAG's ten-week Dance Umbrella Series in 1979-80 presented twenty companies of infinite variety, in an old Fox Movie soundstage that was transformed into a bare-bones but superb performance space. Among groups that performed in this series were the Mel Wong Dance Company, Dan Wagoner Dance Company, the David Gordon/Pick Up Company, Martine van Hamel and Friends, and the Don Redlich Dance Company. The Clark Center for the Performing Arts, which offers dance workshops and performances in ballet, modern, jazz, ethnic and tap, received a 1978-79 award for the development of a new dance theatre space on Theatre Row which, when completed, will provide a desperately needed dance facility for small New York City companies.

Along with the problem of viable theatre space, administrative/managerial assistance has become an urgent issue, especially for the smaller companies, as the dance explosion continues and the already severe expenses of the companies inflate. Both Dance Theater Workshop and TAG offer administrative/managerial and production assistance; Dance Theater Workshop also offers studio rental and advertising discounts, and TAG offers an equipment service. Pentacle Management and Performing Artservices, cooperative management concerns (the latter specifically for contemporary avant garde performing arts groups) have also been supported

In the Council's attempt to address a prime need of the field—for quality choreography and the diversification of repertoires—two initiatives have been taken. One of these provides direct Council support for a limited number of commissions of new works or revivals of existing works by guest choreographers for specific productions or series of performances. A successful example was Paul Taylor's critically acclaimed Le Sacre du Printemps (The Rehearsal), which premiered at City Center during the 1979-80 season. The creation of *Memoria*, conceived by Alvin Ailey as a tribute to the late choreographer Joyce Trisler, was also supported by the Council in 1979-80 through the Dance Theater Foundation. It also premiered at City Center, with members of the Alvin Ailey Repertory Ensemble and the American Dance Center Workshop joining the parent company onstage in the performance. The other step the Council has taken to encourage the maintenance of high choreographic standards involves a pilot grant award in 1978-79 (continued through following years) to the National Association for Regional Ballet to provide choreographic stipends and per diem expenses for professional choreographers to work with a number of New York City and upstate ballet companies. These included Ballet Binghamton, Ithaca Ballet, Mid-Hudson Ballet, Orange County Ballet Theatre, Syracuse Ballet, Berkshire Ballet and the Eglevsky Ballet. Both of these programs are designed to foster the visibility and development of promising young choreographers as well.

The Council's Dance Program also recognized the extreme importance of the historical documentation of dance by film, video and/or labanotation through its support of the New York Public Library's Dance Collection and the Dance Notation Bureau—two organizations whose prime functions are archival.

The National Endowment for the Arts Dance Touring Program is administered through the Dance Program and the Presenting Organizations Program at the Council on the Arts. In 1979-80, thirty-three dance companies were supported in 109 performances across the state through the NEA Dance Touring Program.

In summary, as dance activity in New York State continues to flourish, it demands extraordinary support. Although the Council's Dance Program has attempted to provide meaningful support at all levels, the strenuous needs of the dance field exceed the Council's ability to meet them fully. The ingenuity, strength and resources of both the individual dance companies and the Council will be called upon to meet the challenges of the eighties.

Decentralization Program

In response to a legislative mandate, the Council in 1977-78 created the Decentralization Program as a pilot program (in 1980-81 its trial period ended and it became a full program of the Council). Under its auspices decision-making on certain funding requests devolves to local agencies as part of an effort to respond to and support arts activities on a community or grass roots level. Local regrant agencies administer state funds on behalf of the Council and support the arts in much the same manner as the Council itself does, by awarding Cultural Service Contracts to nonprofit organizations. Applications are made to and evaluated by the regrant agency and its panelists.

Local decision-making is at the heart of the Decentralization Program, as it helps to identify and nourish each community's talents. It also creates a crucial partnership between the Council and the regrant agencies and the subgrantees. For the Council, Decentralization presents an opportunity to learn in depth about certain communities and about the arts population and arts audience of the state. The regrant agencies are exposed to the Council's state-wide perspective on the role of public funding of the arts, while the organizations that are ultimately funded by the regrant agencies can experience a healthy developmental impact in exposure, credibility and improved fundraising and programming skills.

Decentralization is also an effort to expand the Council's capacity to respond to cultural needs at the grass roots level, to identify, nurture, develop and fund meaningful community arts activities. It attends to organizations whose programs encourage an avocational interest in the arts, reaching into many small or insulated communities in an attempt to expand cultural opportunities to wider audiences. The Program operates in many previously underserved areas, both rural and urban. It also deals with special groups such as minorities, ethnic groups, the elderly and the handicapped; a survey of supported programs in 1978-79 showed that 23% were directed to these groups. At the same time, Decentralization can lay a foundation for the future by developing both the state's arts organizations and the state's audience for the arts. It has succeeded in tapping on an arts constituency previously served to only a limited degree: in 1979-80, 87% of the applicants to the regrant agencies had never applied directly to the Council before.

The Program has expanded from its initial 1977-

78 composition of five regrant sites serving nine counties, to a total of fifteen sites for twenty-three counties in 1981-82. (In 1978-79 and 1979-80, thirteen regrant agencies served twenty-one counties.) The regrant agencies themselves vary from site to site: they may be arts councils, county governments or regional advisory panels. No single application or award can be greater than \$3,000; nor can any organization that applied directly to the Council be eligible to apply locally for Decentralization funds for the same year. The application process is identical to the Council's, including review by peer panelists.

Funding levels for the regrant agencies themselves are determined by the:

- number of cultural organizations residing in the site and applying directly to the Council
- number of cultural organizations residing in the site and that would be eligible to apply for Decentralization funds
- staff size and total budget of the regranting agency
- population and geographic area of the site.

The sites are selected by the Council's Decentralization Advisory Committee, which is composed of representatives of the Council's governing board, Council staff, and members-at-large from across the state.

The types of programs and services for which funds were awarded vary greatly. They include: folk and film festivals, children's film series, local history projects, community theatre productions, dance workshops, painting and printmaking workshops, jazz concerts, poetry readings, chamber music concerts, educational kits on American Indian artifacts, and lecture series. Some specific awards included \$800 to the Village of Penn Yan for audiovisual presentations of information on local history gathered from older citizens. The Bakers Bridge Association in Alfred Station received \$500 to produce a handbound portfolio and slide presentation on the area's early settlers and their architecture. And the Cortland Free Library received \$1800 for an oral history project focusing on the immigrant experience in Cortland County. In Yates County four performances of Oklahoma were supported, and each was sold out. Thursday Morning Musicales in Elmira presented pianist Lili Kraus. (More information on projects supported can be obtained by writing to the regrant agencies directly.)

The support of the National Endowment for the Arts, itself very interested in decentralization, has

been crucial to the success of the Program. In 1977-78, the Endowment provided the Program's entire budget of \$124,314. In the following two years, it contributed \$120,628 and \$141,860.

Film Program

Film in its many facets has long been a major fixture in American life, with a continual hold on both American popular and artistic imaginations. New York State has a long history of film activity, from pre-Hollywood productions to today's thriving independent filmmaking community and a growing return of commercial film production and financing. The long traditions of film as art and film as popular culture are ultimately entwined in providing subject and audience. Recognizing this interdependence, the Council in its Film Program has responded to an increasingly articulate constituency by supporting a wide variety of professional organizations whose activities encourage the production, presentation, distribution and study of high quality film. A particular emphasis has been given to projects that increase public awareness, understanding and appreciation of film through community exhibition, workshops and forums for filmmakers, in an effort to provide support structures necessary to film's continued vitality.

Over the three years reported here, Ira Wohl's poignant *Best Boy* (supported through the New York State Association for Retarded Children) won an Academy Award for documentary films (as had Barbara Kopple's *Harlan County, U.S.A.*, supported by the Council in 1976-77). A special Academy Award was also presented to the Museum of Modern Art's film department in recognition of its many contributions to the art of film; Council support there has assisted film preservation, exhibition and study

programs.

The Council continued its support of the Film Society of Lincoln Center and its New York Film Festival, an international event where important new foreign and American films are screened. Each year the work of major established filmmakers and of new, lesser known directors receive premieres at this Festival. In 1979 the New York Film Festival was augmented by the addition of the American Independents Festival as a sidebar: supported in part by the Council through Film Fund, this separate series of screenings of independently-produced feature-length films was a critical and popular success, and for the first time secured prominent visibility for independent film. Other Council-supported outlets for independents over these years included Entermedia's American Mavericks Festival and Educational Broadcasting Corporation's (WNET) "Independent Focus" series.

The Black Filmmakers Cooperative and Film

Forum presented, with Council support, a series of screenings involving dialogues between independent Black filmmakers from the New York area and community audiences. The films were shown in non-traditional screening facilities to broaden the reach of these artists' work.

The Film Program enlarged the range of the filmmaking process that it helps support in considering applications relating to screenwriting. The Writers Guild of America was supported by the Council in its offering of screenwriters' fellowships, which is combined with a "mentor" program that offers an original model for the development of

young screenwriters.

As production requests grew in number, production guidelines for the Film Program were developed and expanded over the three years. Filmmakers now have a regularized source of potential support and can choose to apply in the more suitable of two categories (depending upon funding level). Also, professional film production internships are now supported by the Council; internships at the Astoria Motion Picture Studios that provided interns the opportunity to work on professional productions there were among these.

Cine Information was supported in the development of a computer system intended to pair users of independent films with filmmakers working on specific subjects. Independent Cinema Artists and Producers and the Foundation for Independent Video and Film received support toward developing public television markets for independent film.

The Film Program offers support in a number of distinct categories. Among recent films receiving support for Production expenses were Steve Forman, Abbie Fink and Dennis Lanson's The Phans of Jersey City (through Brooklyn Arts and Culture Association); Robert Gardner's Clarence and Angel (through Children's Art Carnival); Ken Kobland's The Lost Ones (through Performing Artservices); and Mikhail Bogin's A Private Life. Organizations conducting Film Workshops included Brooklyn Arts and Culture Association, Frederick Douglass Creative Arts Center and Women's Interart Center. Among recipients in the category of General Organizational Support were the Astoria Motion Picture and Television Foundation, the Film Society of Lincoln Center and the Foundation for Independent Video and Film.

Services to the field, a category including information access and distribution, were performed by such organizations as the Center for Arts Information, Educational Film Library Association and the New York Public Library. Exhibition projects are



supported; groups providing these included Black Filmmakers Cooperative, Film Forum and New Community Cinema Club.

Other categories (and some of their recipients) were: Film Series (Museum of the American Indian; Polish Community Center of Buffalo; Troy Public Library); Festivals (92nd Street YM-YWHA; Film Society of Lincoln Center); Film Acquisition (Mid-Hudson Library System; Chautauqua-Cattaraugus Library System); Equipment Access (Young Filmakers Foundation; Media Study; Portable Channel); Publications (Cine Information; Millenium Film Workshops; Educational Film Library Association); Archival and Preservation (International Museum of Photography; Museum of Modern Art); Broadcast/Telecast (Educational Broadcasting Corporation; Independent Cinema Artists and Producers); and Special Projects (Black Filmmakers Cooperative).

A newly instituted category of support, beginning in 1980-81, is Arts Programming for Television, in which film art takes another art form as its subject, thereby securing a broader audience for both.

Literature Program

Although the Council made a handful of grants to literary organizations between 1965 and 1970, the Literature Program was not established as a separate department until 1970-71, when a total of six projects were supported. In 1977-78, the first of the three years reviewed here, the Literature Program disbursed \$591,111 to forty-four organizations. By 1979-80, the program's continuing growth was reflected in total support of \$725,000 to eighty organizations providing a variety of programs and services designed to encourage the creation, publication, distribution and public awareness of quality poetry, fiction, playwriting and nonfiction prose. During this period of growth, the Council has come to understand its role in the support of literature as that of developing and nurturing the art of writing, as well as the public appreciation of writing.

While the Literature Program continues to emphasize its original support to organizations that provide a platform for writers to share their work and skills, and develop audiences in the communities and schools (by funding such groups as Allentown Community Center in Buffalo, the 92nd Street YM-YWHA and Teachers and Writers), it also now addresses the equally vital concerns of the creation of literature and the conditions necessary to sustain

it.

Activities related to the development of literature that have been supported in the last three years by the Council include Workspace projects, which offer the writer time and space to work. Groups that have received support in this area include Yaddo and Millay Colony for Artists, both in upstate New York. In these nurturing environments, writers who have already achieved some major accomplishment or who are perhaps on the verge of doing so and are in a critical period of their professional careers have been able to complete or begin new works. The Literature Program also supports Visiting Writersin-Residence programs in communities throughout New York State. In 1979-80, eleven writers were supported in residencies ranging from two weeks to nine months with such organizations as the Polish Community Center of Buffalo, the Schoharie Arts Council and the Rockland Center for the Arts. These residencies have a two-fold pupose: to provide a writer time to work on his or her writing, and to support the writer in organizing community programming such as coordinating workshops, holding individual conferences and giving community readings.

The situation confronting the writer in the late seventies and early eighties is far different from that of the mid-sixties. Publication, essential to the continuance of literature, becomes increasingly difficult and complex as one publishing house after another is taken over by larger corporations where the dedication to literature is often obscured by an obsession with the bottom line. As paper and printing costs increase, sometimes as drastically as fifty percent a year, and as postal rates rise, even the non-commercial publishers whose primary interest lies in new literature are finding it necessary to cut back production. The Literature Program has recently attempted to increase direct support to alternative presses and literary magazines to ensure writers their necessary forum. Recipients of Council assistance have included BOA Editions in Brockport, Station Hill Press in Barrytown, Fiction Collective in New York City, and the Coordinating Council of Literary Magazines (CCLM), which serves as a statewide service organization for the small press. The Literature Program has also increased support to non-commercial distribution networks in order to broaden the reading audience and to promote the sales of alternative publications. Many of the writers now considered to have established the foundation of American literature, including Whitman, Zora Neale Hurston, T.S. Eliot and Gertrude Stein, were first published in the small press world. Admittedly, we are too close today to know which of the writers published with Council support by alternative presses will join those distinguished ranks decades from now-but we do know that appropriate Council support is crucial to this cause.

Given the severe pressures on its budget, the Literature Program has only recently begun to offer some administrative and general operating support. It is as unrealistic as it is unproductive to think that coordinators of literary programs should continue to donate their services, just as it is to assume that writers need only pencil and paper to live to create the meaningful works of literature that alter our

vision of the world in which we live.

Since 1977, the Literature Program has received approximately fifty new applications each year. Like writing itself, the program cuts across many of the Council disciplines and today supports new drama scripts, oral histories and translation, as well as works of poetry, fiction and nonfiction. It is estimated that about one-third of all U.S. writers live in New York State, and the Council is committed to maintaining "the paramount position of this state in the nation and the world" as it relates to the literary arts.







Media Program

The Media Program at the New York State Council on the Arts was developed in 1970; during the Program's ten years of growth, New York State has gained recognition as an international center for alternative uses of television and radio and innovative trends in video, audio and multi-media. Aesthetic accomplishments in color and form have been created through electronic compositions; serious statements that challenge the control of viewership by commercial television have been produced; television technology has been taken apart, re-designed and reconstructed to make it a more varied performance medium for the artist; societal and personal concerns have been expressed in new formats; community video has flourished; artists have turned their cameras on the other arts in order to find new ways to capture them for television; and works that address the very basis of perception itself have come out of the video field as have documentaries of professional caliber on a myriad of interesting subjects.

During the three years of this report, the Council has directed funds to numerous areas of the media field to assist in the development of this relatively new and unique art form. In some areas, Council support appears to have been essential to its development. Because of the costs of high technology (a disadvantage offset by the tremendous audience potential of media), artist participation would perhaps have been severely limited, if not for Council support of production and post-production facilities. Through the Council's Production Program, scores of artists in audio and video have emerged to create a recognized body of work through co-producing organizations (such as public television stations and media centers). Council support of Post-Production Facilities has helped to make possible such excellent editing and finishing facilities as the TV Lab at Channel 13 and the Sound Studios at ZBS Foundation. Council support has also been provided to Media Resource Centers such as Media Study in Buffalo, a multi-function organization where production work, exhibition, promotion, advertising and curatorship may be done under one roof.

The Service Projects Program has supported organizations that provide video and audio arts with information, studies, distribution, publications and advocacy. Statewide service organizations include the Media Equipment Rental Service, administered by Young Filmmaker's Foundation, and the Media Bureau, administered by the Kitchen Center for Video, Music and Dance. Both organizations additionally serve as re-grant agencies for modest ex-

penses including speakers' fees, public screenings, residencies and production. Under the Exhibition Program, the Council has supported the Museum of Modern Art, the Whitney Museum of American Art, the Kitchen Center for Video, Music and Dance, Media Study, and Visual Studies Workshop for their enthusiastic and dedicated video departments which acquire, exhibit and study this new art form. The Chautauqua, Mid-York, Mid-Hudson, and New York Public Libraries have also developed impressive archives and exhibition programs in video for the public, and in 1978-79, the American Film Festival added video to its screening schedule with Council support. The Council's Workshop Program in video has also flourished with the small format, easy-touse video equipment allowing a variety of artistic applications from training for the community to experimentation with dance notation.

A newly instituted category of support, beginning in 1980-81, is Arts Programming for Television, in which video art takes another art form as its subject, thereby securing a broader audience for both.

Council funds for media arts are disbursed across the state. But the field of media also has a special quality about its production and dissemination process that makes all media ventures typically statewide. Media artists themselves are mobile in the electronic arts and will travel to another part of the state to work if they need equipment of certain specifications or are attracted to the access policy of a particular organization. For example, sophisticated computer editing of television tapes is available to artists primarily in the Manhattan, Central New York and Genesee Valley areas. Artists are also aware that the Capital area offers one of the finest audio laboratories, and the Experimental Television Center in Chemung Valley is well known as a place where electronic artists may re-design the electronic equipment. The work media artists produce and exhibit may be broadcast across the state or mailed as a video or audiotape to any part of the state. In this way, the media art form is constantly "on tour."

As successfully as the media arts have developed in New York State, there remains a need in the field for greater development, access for the field itself, and stability. Networking systems for television programming need to be researched and developed, as do video laboratories for beginners and artists from other disciplines who wish to begin experimenting with the medium of television but have no access to cameras on an informal or inexpensive basis. Finally, curatorial conferences and seminars would improve the visibility of the electronic arts and nurture the growth of a body of critical literature, and therefore also of an educated audience appreciation.





Museum Aid Program

The museum, as institution, is charged with three unique responsibilities in our society: the preservation, exhibition and interpretation of objects of value in art, history and science that represent, ultimately, the values, concerns and contexts of a continually evolving world. As the past becomes ever larger, the present perhaps more overwhelming, and our grasp of the future tentative and exploratory, the museum's astounding resources have become increasingly important in our efforts toward enlightenment and inspiration.

The Museum Aid Program at the Council on the Arts continues to provide critical on-going Basic Support for the operations of museums. As of 1979-80, funds for salaries and other expenses essential to the museum's operations were made available to all sizes of institutions; previously, these funds were available to the larger institutions only. This recognition of the reality of the struggle museums face simply to survive is designed to help make possible the museum's commitment to posterity.

The largest percentage of Program Support continues to be provided for exhibitions and education/ interpretation. Museum Aid support in traditional areas included funds directed toward the exhibition of the permanent collection at the Cooper-Hewitt Museum, the exhibition "Africa in Antiquity: The Arts of Ancient Nubia and the Sudan" at the Brooklyn Museum, and toward the opening of the new permanent collection gallery at the Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum.

Changes in Program Support reflect a streamlining of the Council process and new concerns of the museum field. Cooperative programs involving the sharing of resources among museums and museumrelated organizations for the purpose of expanding or improving museum programs and their impact on a community or region were initiated. One example is the Council allocation to the Rensselaer County Historical Society for the purpose of hiring an education director to create programs at that site and at Historic Cherry Hill in Albany. The cooperative effort was then expanded to include programs with the Rensselaer County Junior Museum; this science-oriented institution's focus on school programs provided an added dimension.

For the first time also, in an innovative program of cooperative effort, the New York State Council on the Arts and the New York Council for the Humanities collaborated in providing joint support for special projects. The Historians-in-Residence Program, sponsored by Cornell University, New York Historical Resources Center, has met with enthusiastic response. Another special project, "Places of Origin," was sponsored by the Institute for Research in History in New York City. The Council on the Arts supported the visual component of that exhibition while the Council for the Humanities supported the research component.

As we continue to grow and re-evaluate and reinterpret our culture, the need for alternative reference and resource has also made itself apparent. Two funding categories of the Museum Aid Program address this issue in particular. One of these is Interpretation of Collections, which supports new programs that focus on previously neglected aspects of collections or sites with encouragement for experimentation in new techniques and formats. Organizations that have undertaken such programs include the DeWitt Historical Society of Tompkins County with its exhibition of an important collection of local photographs by Verne Morton, and the Wayne County Historical Society with its program relating the history and interpretation of the county jail and the history of crime in Wayne County. The other new funding category is the Local History Program, for special research projects that involve non-traditional interpretation of local history, using oral history documentation, folklore or video documentation in areas concerned with unique ethnic, regional and community history, and artistic trends related to a locality or region. Examples of successful projects include those sponsored by the Dobbs Ferry Historical Society, for the documentation of the heritage of its Italian-American community; and Arts Projects at St. Mark's Church In-The-Bowery in New York City, for a community documentation project that resulted in the publication of a series of oral history interviews with community residents.

The Museum Aid Program has also established several competitive programs to help alleviate difficulties posed by economic constraints: for museum interns, to provide training for future museum professionals; for conservation of collections and renovations of permanent exhibits in science, history and historic house museums; and for the development of energy efficiency plans for museums.

The Museum Aid Program has also sought to strengthen regional historical service organizations. Such groups include Regional Conference of Historical Agencies (Manlius), Federation of Historical Services (Old Chatham), Lower Hudson Conference: Historical Agencies and Museums (White Plains), and Metropolitan Historic Structures Association (NYC).

Historical societies and history museums themselves received special focus through the creation of a new staff position, History Museums Coordinator. This was made possible by a National Endowment for the Arts grant to the Council.

Finally, accessibility of museums to the public has remained an important concern; to this end, programs for handicapped audiences have been encouraged and implemented, as well as general programs encouraging broad community access to a museum's resources, including workshops, classes, demonstrations, lectures and tours.

In light of expanding and diversifying interests and needs, the Museum Aid Program has welcomed a wide variety of funding requests from museums across the state and will continue to attempt to meet them with due responsiveness.



Music Program

The enormous accessibility to, interest in, and portability of the many kinds of music make it one of the most protean of the arts supported by the Council. With an annual budget in the \$5 million range, the Music Program funds a wide spectrum of music organizations which themselves encompass performances of orchestral, operatic, jazz, folk, chamber, contemporary, early and vocal music. Through active interchange within and between the regions of New York State, these organizations have effected a diffusion of activities and an exchange of ideas with many-sided benefits. With the support of the Council, most of the state's major and many of its smaller groups have toured across New York, at least to some extent, and many smaller upstate groups have provided programs and services both throughout and beyond their home regions.

In response to an increasing number of requests for assistance from organizations wishing to present performing artists and companies in music, dance and theatre, usually from areas other than their own, the Council created a new program, Presenting Organizations, in 1978-79. The number of applications to the Music Program decreased by 81 in 1978-79 after the transfer of these applications to the Presenting Organizations Program; the total dollar amount of requests to the Music Program, however, remained high at \$11,859,580 as compared to the previous year's figure of \$11,961,728. Music, a phenomenally vigorous field, continues to challenge the Council's resourcefulness in attempting to meet its many needs within a limited budget.

Special attention has been given to continuing unique and valuable cooperative efforts and exchanges not covered by the Presenting Organizations Program. Notable among music service organizations with extraordinary programs is Meet the Composer which, with New York City as its administrative base, supports locally generated concerts, workshops and lectures involving indigenous music groups across the state. Individual composers are invited to participate in these concerts, affording many of the listeners a unique concert hall experience while at the same time giving the composer a chance to bring his or her work to a larger public. Other innovative programs include Jazzmobile, which sends artists to all parts of the state at the invitation of a community, and Theatre Development Fund (TDF), which makes music accessible through reduced-pricing programs and operates throughout the metropolitan New York City area

and in western New York State. Toward improved communication of information, Council support has served to facilitate exchanges between music organizations. In 1978-79, for example, the Council through the Music Program co-sponsored a conference of all the state's professional opera companies. More than thirty opera companies attended, and the conference resulted in maximum use of available resources and facilities through sharing, as well as an exciting exchange of information.

The Council, in its Music Program, continues to attempt to support the different areas of music to the best of its ability. Each of these areas has its own special and individual qualities, its own concerns, rewards, demands and needs. Among the larger categories to which Music Program funds have been directed are orchestras and opera companies. At the same time, choral music has been the subject of much concern in the last three years, particularly the plight of the professional singer, who finds it ever more difficult to make a living. The Council, through its Music Program, has undertaken a survey of the choral field to determine how best to address its needs. Also important among the Music Program's concerns is support to contemporary American music. Particularly dramatic is the state of the record industry: in the dire straits in which this entire field finds itself, contemporary music suffers especially severely. In response to many requests from the field, the Council has begun to support nonprofit recordings.

Pervading all of these concerns are the basic problems of the on-going financial hardships for most performing arts organizations and the difficult choices they face in trying to keep their organizations afloat while simultaneously nurturing musical artistry of the highest caliber. Scarce financial resources can force painful sacrifices of items ranging from artists' or technicians' fees to publicity or audience development. Music requires the concerned and constant support of the public if it is to serve the public well. The State Council on the Arts, as a public funding agency for the arts, will continue to explore and attempt to aid in the resolution of these issues as the value and importance of music, evident in this report, continues to impress and

grow.







Presenting Organizations Program

The Council has long supported the presentation or touring of performing arts groups. In the 1960s the Council itself administered this support directly, through its Touring Program; through the early and middle 1970s, this support continued to be provided through the Council process as well as through the separate small grants program called the Presenting Organizations Assistance Program (POAP), administered for the Council by the New York Foundation for the Arts.

In 1977-78 POAP was reabsorbed by the Council, in accordance with legislative mandate and to respond more directly to the needs of this particular segment of the Council's constituency. The renamed Presenting Organizations Program had its first year of full operations in 1978-79, as many presenting and touring requests previously handled in other

Council programs were redirected.

The creation of the Presenting Organizations Program was felt to respond to at least three separate needs. It recognized a growing constituency of presentors from all over the state, and established a specific Council department to deal with their applications and articulate their needs. It also provided the Council, in keeping with the mandate contained in its enabling legislation, a means of encouraging the dissemination of quality performing artists and companies throughout the state, and of enhancing the cultural opportunities available to the state's citizens. Thirdly, it would ultimately serve the performing arts themselves by nurturing the growth of performance opportunities and the development of present and future audiences necessary to the continued existence and flourishment of the performing arts.

By 1980-81, the Program was supporting a constituency of approximately 150 active presentors in 56 of New York State's 62 counties. In 1979-80, the last of the three years reported here, the Council supported 2,065 performances with funding to 153 presenting organizations; audiences totaled more than 2.5 million. Of those Council-supported performances that year, 708 music groups presented 48.7%; 248 dance companies performed in 26.4% of the appearances; and 184 theatre groups were presented in the remaining 24.9%. Of the Program's total expenditures, 75.8% went to support presen-

tors outside of Manhattan.

The Council through the Presenting Organizations Program directs its support to artists' fees, primarily (in 1979-80, 83.1%), and to production,

promotional and technical assistance expenses. Evaluative criteria include program quality, marketing abilities, technical proficiency, administrative competence, community outreach and support, and audience impact

dience impact.

The range of organizations supported is broad. It includes large and internationally distinguished institutions, as well as many small, volunteer presenting organizations that are crucial to the cultural life of their communities. They range from full-time presentors to arts councils and cultural centers to educational institutions, municipalities, museums and libraries. Artists and arts groups who have been presented with assistance from the Presenting Organizations Program have included the Indianapolis Symphony and Philadelphia Orchestras; the Rochester Philharmonic, Buffalo Philharmonic and Syracuse Symphony Orchestras; the New York City Ballet, American Ballet Theatre, and the Eliot Feld, Paul Taylor, Merce Cunningham, Alvin Ailey and Martha Graham dance companies; the Stuttgart and Cuban Ballets; Richard Morse Mime Theatre, Comedie Francaise, and the Globe and Folger Theatres; Opera Theatre of Syracuse, International Art of Jazz, Catskill Stompers, and Country Dance and Song Society; such internationally acclaimed artists as James Galway, Victoria de los Angeles and Alicia De Larrocha; Preservation Hall Jazz Band, Tashi, and the Guarneri and Concord String Quartets, as well as fiddlers in fiddling contests.

A highlight of the Program's first full year was the development and support of a 21/2-week tour by the New York City Ballet, which was the result of a unique partnership among presentors, funding agencies and the City Ballet. In March 1979 the company traveled to Rochester, Buffalo and Syracuse, playing to capacity audiences totaling 43,000 at 16 performances. Of the project's total cost of \$570,830, Council support to the local presentors the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra, Friends of the Buffalo Theatre, and the Cultural Resources Council of Syracuse and Onondaga County—provided \$138,964. The National Endowment for the Arts Dance Touring Program (administered in New York State through the Council) also supported the tour, with \$92,550 toward the company's fee.

Other highlights included the first statewide conference of presenting organizations, developed with Council support by the Foundation for the Extension and Development of the American Professional Theatre and held in Syracuse in April 1979. It was followed up by the initiation of the Management Assistance Project, separate workshops for small volunteer and for medium-sized presentors, held in

Rochester, Keuka Park and Woodstock in the summer of 1980 (a joint project of the Program's staff and the Cultural Resources Council of Syracuse and Onondaga County).

Month-long festivals of Black and Hispanic performing arts at Lincoln Center were supported through the Afro-American Total Theatre Arts Foundation; these featured dance, theatre and music ensembles from across the United States, from England and from Nigeria. The Presenting Organizations Program initiated a New Presentor Development Project, to encourage the development of presenting organizations and of the performing arts in areas of the state with limited indigenous activity; in 1979-80, five organizations were supported in this project, in the counties of Chenango, Schoharie, Broome, Rensselaer and Ulster. Through the National Fine Arts Committee for the Lake Placid Olympics, the Program supported the presentation of New York State artists and groups in and around the village of Lake Placid throughout the 1980 Winter Olympic Games.





Special Arts Services Program

Originated in the early sixties and formerly known as Special Programs, Special Arts Services became one of the three newly defined departments under the expanded Division of Special Programs in 1977. Directly concerned with development, the primary function of the Special Arts Services Program is to provide outreach into the diverse ethnic communities of the state to promote professionally directed arts activities in locations that may be isolated geographically and/or culturally. Special Arts Services assists in the development of these communities by helping to build and sustain institutions spanning all arts disciplines and offering programs of particular interest to specific ethnic minorities.

In its formative years, Special Arts Services chiefly addressed the needs of Black and Hispanic communities. It has since expanded, serving Native American, Asian/Pacific-American, European Ethnic, and other groups, in fulfillment of its multiethnic, multi-cultural and multi-disciplinary nature.

Special Arts Services support is extended to both professional performing and visual arts organizations, and to both established institutions and groups in early stages of development with strong potential for growth and stability in the arts world and the community. During 1977-80, Special Arts Services continued to support such groups as Dance Theatre of Harlem, now entering its twelfth year of operation with international stature as a major performing ballet company; the Native American Center for the Living Arts in Niagara Falls, a museum gaining national attention; and The Family, an Obie Award-winning repertory company based in New York City that tours throughout New York State. Receiving Council support for the first time during this same period were such groups as Buffalo Arts and Music, which offers a highly regarded choral training program; Chinese Music Ensemble in New York City, which presents concerts and workshops in classical, folk and modern Chinese music; and the Visual Arts Research and Resource Center Relating to the Caribbean in New York City, which presents a variety of forums and activities including the Caribbean Expressions Festival.

Multi-arts and community cultural centers have also received Council support, allowing for the development of a wide range of cultural events and professional performances, training and exhibitions focused within the community. The Greek Cultural Center in Astoria, for example, has successfully served the Greek-American community and the general public with its outstanding programs in dance, literature and theatre.

Additionally, the Council has funded in part many

special events and arts-oriented cultural festivals such as the Balkan Arts Center's winter and summer festivals in New York City, the West Indian-American Day Carnival Association's annual Labor Day Festival in Brooklyn, and the town of Cheektowaga's Polish American Cultural Festival.

The Special Arts Services Program also provides support for what it considers to be irreplaceable public services (i.e., arts services in settings not in the cultural mainstream), funding arts activities and performances by and for hospital groups, prison groups, senior citizen centers and other culturally isolated populations including migrant camps. Hospital Audiences in New York City, and Theatre for the Forgotten and New York Street Theatre Caravan, both based in New York City with touring schedules around the state, are among groups that provide these services. One organization that provides a particularly unique service is the Arts Council of Wyoming County, which works with the Geneseo Migrant Center to bring professional artists into the migrant camps to present workshops during the two months of the harvest season. This pioneer project of the Geneseo Migrant Center has been recognized as a national model by the federal Department of Health and Human Services.

During 1977-80, the Special Arts Services Program directed a total of \$8,593,826 to 274 different groups. The total audience of the performances, workshops and other arts events presented during this period is estimated in the hundreds of thousands and perhaps more, considering outdoor and television exposure. This audience continues to grow, including as it does many citizens of New York State who may not have previously had the opportunity to participate in and experience this obviously rich and varied repertory of arts events. Benefiting equally are the artists, who gain performance and exhibition opportunities as well as audience development, both essential to their professional careers. Many artists, particularly ethnic minorities, receive vital community support, often at times when the promise of the artist's work is not encouraged or acknowledged elsewhere, that enables

them to establish successful careers.

The Council, through its Special Arts Services Program, will continue its part in this important process, supporting programs that are special often because of their adherence to ethnic traditions and their transformations of those traditions in professional performance. These are programs that represent and reach the many peoples of New York State. Art, at its best and most pleasurable, provides a special "shock of recognition." It is this recognition that the Special Arts Services Program seeks to encourage.

Theatre Program

Theatre in New York State sustains a long tradition of excellence and innovation. Most of the nation's plays, production concepts and theatre artists develop here in an environment that acts simultaneously as a showcase for achievement and a national measure of accomplishment.

New York State is home to a peerless array of nonprofit theatres, from the major Off-Broadway and Off-Off-Broadway companies to children's theatre and to many fine regional theatres in several upstate cities. While the resident theatre movement across the nation has been exceptionally productive in recent years, these organizations are intimately tied to

what happens in New York.

Through the Theatre Program, the Council directs its support to nonprofit companies whose work achieves significant artistic contributions or important public services. In the three funding years 1977-78 through 1979-80, 152, 155 and 154 theatre organizations were supported (compared with 128 in 1975-76). In 1979-80, the last of the three years reported here, 272 theatre organizations applied for support. Of these, 178 applications (65%) were from New York City.

In that year, large institutional theatres in New York City received 41% of the Program's total funding. Twenty regional (resident professional) theatres accounted for 14% of Theatre funding. Off-Off-Broadway theatres, collectively an important creative arena for theatre artists in the nation, received 28% of the Program's total awards. Organizations providing services to the professional theatre community received another 9%. The Theatre Program's funding was completed by continued support to children's theatres, regional summer theatres and community theatres.

A new and successful development in the Theatre Program over the three year period of this report was the establishment of a project for support of Literary Managers. It was the first such project in the country; following the Council's lead, the National Endowment for the Arts subsequently developed a similar program. Companies receiving funds for Literary Manager projects included American Place Theatre, Chelsea Theatre Center, Ensemble Studio Theatre, Negro Ensemble Company, PAF Playhouse, Phoenix Theatre, Playwrights Horizons and Syracuse Stage.

The Theatre Program's Younger Audience Play Commission Project, begun in 1974-75, concluded with the First All Children Theatre's successful production of *The Incredible Feeling Show* by Elizabeth Swados. The Program also supported such acclaimed shows as Samm-Art Williams's *Home*, produced by the Negro Ensemble Company, the New York Shakespeare Festival's production of Gilbert and Sullivan's *Pirates of Penzance* (which played in New York City's Central Park in the summer of 1980), the La Mama E.T.C.'s production of *As You Like It*, directed by Andrei Serban, and a three-play, month-long residency at La Mama by Peter Brook's International Center for Theatre Research.

Another major project supported by the Theatre Program was the establishment of the BAM Repertory Company at the Brooklyn Academy of Music. More generally, the Program continued its support of three dozen theatre institutions that work exclu-

sively with new American playwrights.

A more trying concern for the Theatre Program during these years was helping the nonprofit theatre constituency in New York State cope with the dual problems of inflation and the significant reduction in available funds from the Council and other sources. Economic problems are magnified in the performing arts, which are highly labor-intensive and expensive to produce. This is an issue that binds all theatres in the state, and will require creative responses from artistic directors, their administrative staffs, and funding sources.

Visual Arts Services Program

The Visual Arts Services Program looks for excellence along the entire spectrum of visual arts activities. At one end, funds are awarded to experimental and avant garde expressions of contemporary art, and at the other to community-based workshop programs. This range in the type of activities funded helps to spread Visual Arts Services support

throughout the state.

The original mandate of the Visual Arts Services Program (created in 1970-71 as Community Projects in the Visual Arts) was to broaden the audience for the visual arts. This was accomplished by the support of exhibitions and a variety of art training programs. As the number of requests to the program increased, the parameters of the program expanded. In its evolution over the past decade, the Visual Arts Services Program has had as its major concern the provision of more support to artists to help them in making their art, as well as the promotion of broader public appreciation.

Certain changes in the field have aided enormously in the Council's ability to meet the needs of individual artists through the support of nonprofit organizations. The notable development of a large number of Alternative Exhibition Spaces that provide exhibition possibilities for artists beyond what is available in conventional galleries or museums stimulated increased Council support to such spaces. In 1975, approximately 15% of the Visual Arts Services budget was directed to Alternative Spaces; in 1979-80, that figure doubled, and 30% of the budget was awarded to some twenty Alternative Spaces

throughout the state.

In addition to Alternative Exhibition Spaces, the Visual Arts Services Program supports Artists Cooperatives, Outside Collaborations (work with nonvisual arts organizations in the production of set designs and costumes, graphic designs, displays, posters, publicity materials), and Artists Performances; it commissions permanent and temporary works of public art; and it funds non-commercial publications (including artists books) that are essentially print outlets by and for visual artists. In the past, such projects had been funded on a random basis; as the Council enters its 1980-81 funding cycle, the Visual Arts Services Program has revised its guidelines to more formally emphasize and effectively accommodate such support for artists' projects.

Public appreciation and understanding of the visual arts is achieved by the support of contemporary

and traditional exhibitions and hands-on programs such as workshops and training for the professional or aspiring artist. The major photography centers, located primarily in upstate communities, present outstanding exhibitions, intensive workshop series, seminars and residency situations for professional photographers, for example.

Visual Arts Services also continues its support to community-based organizations ranging from grass roots craft programs to participatory mural projects in urban areas. Community arts also means support to special or isolated audiences, and programs that serve inmates of prisons, school children and senior citizens have been supported when they have been

innovative or model situations.

Finally, aid to developing organizations has been increased, with three particularly effective tools provided for the services of these groups. One has been the development of an adjunct to the Visual Arts Services Program, an Upstate Visual Arts Coordinator (a position created with the assistance of the National Endowment for the Arts) whose main responsibility is to work with organizations, helping them to develop programmatically and administratively. Another has been support to the Gallery Association of New York State (GANYS) which provides traveling exhibitions (very often to groups that have not previously had gallery programs) and serves as technical assistant, exhibition designer and general program planner where needed, and additionally provides subsidized fine arts insurance and art transport to member organizations in every county of the state. And finally, funds have been appropriated for long-term artists residencies which offer quality artistic input and general program expertise to newer organizations that are in need of direction.

Activities in the disciplines of painting, drawing, printmaking, crafts, the decorative arts, photography, sculpture, installation art and artist performance are represented in this three year funding report. Examples of program highlights include: 1977-78
